HORTICULTURE - JUDGING CRITERIA

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

General Criteria for Fruits and Vegetables

• **Uniformity**: Entries should be consistent in size, shape, and colour. For example, six tomatoes should be nearly identical in appearance.

• Condition and Freshness:

- o Produce must be *ripe but firm*, free from blemishes, bruises, or disease.
- Skins should be clean but *not polished*—natural bloom is often preferred (e.g., apples).

Size and Shape:

- Optimal size for the variety is key—not too large or small.
- Shape should be typical of the cultivar and symmetrical (e.g., carrots should be well-shouldered and free from side shoots).

• Colour and Maturity:

- o Rich, vibrant colour appropriate to the variety.
- o Maturity should be ideal—not underripe or overripe.

Stalks and Calyx:

- Fruits and vegetables should retain their stalks or calyx where applicable (e.g., tomatoes, apples, citrus).
- Taste and Aroma (if applicable):
 - O Judges may sample entries for flavour, sweetness, texture, and aroma—especially for fruits.

Specialty Varieties:

Heirloom or unusual cultivars may be recognized for biodiversity and uniqueness.

Tips for Exhibitors

- Always refer to the show schedule and class descriptions.
- Pick produce at the right time—often early morning or late afternoon before the show.
- Use water to keep leafy vegetables fresh on the bench.
- · Avoid excessive trimming or polishing unless specified.

POTTED PLANTS

General Criteria for Potted Plants

- Health & Vigor: Exceptionally healthy, vigorous growth; no signs of pests, disease, or stress.
- Form & Structure: Well-balanced, symmetrical, and true to type; excellent branching or foliage.
- Foliage Quality: Clean, vibrant, and typical of the species; no blemishes or discoloration.
- Flowering or Fruiting (if applicable): Abundant, well-timed blooms or fruit; vibrant and healthy.
- Pot Suitability & Cleanliness: Pot complements plant size and style; clean and undamaged.
- Labelling & Identification: Clearly labelled with correct botanical and/or common name.
- Overall Impact: Outstanding visual appeal; harmonious and well-presented.

Tips for Exhibitors

- Always refer to the show schedule and class descriptions.
- Choose Your Best Specimen Early: Select your entry at least a week before the show to monitor its condition.
 Look for plants with balanced growth, vibrant foliage, and no signs of stress. Avoid last-minute swaps—judges notice preparation.
- Clean and Match the Pot: Wipe down the pot and remove any soil smudges or water stains. Choose a pot that suits the plant's size and style.

CUT FLOWERS

General Criteria for Cut Flowers

- Condition & Freshness: Petals and foliage should be crisp, vibrant, and free from blemishes, wilting, or damage.
- Form & Symmetry: Blooms should be well-shaped and balanced; stems should be straight and upright.
- Colour & Uniformity: Rich, even color typical of the variety; consistent across all stems in the entry.
- Stem & Foliage Quality: Stems should be clean and strong; foliage (if present) should be healthy and undamaged.
- Suitability to Class: Entry must match the class description and be at the appropriate stage of bloom.
- Overall Impact: The entry should have strong visual appeal, harmony, and be well-presented.

Tips for Exhibitors

- Always refer to the show schedule and class descriptions.
- Harvest Thoughtfully: Cut flowers early in the morning or late afternoon for best freshness. Use clean, sharp tools and place stems in water immediately.
- Condition Before Showing: Remove any damaged petals or leaves, trim stems neatly, and hydrate blooms overnight. Avoid overhandling—natural beauty wins points.

EGGS

General Criteria for Eggs

- Uniformity of Size and Shape: Eggs should be consistent in size and shape across the entry. No obvious
 variation or irregularities.
- **Shell Condition:** Shells must be clean, smooth, and free from cracks, stains, or blemishes. Natural bloom should be retained—no polishing.
- Shell Colour and Texture: Colour should be even and typical of the breed. Texture should be smooth and uniform.
- **Presentation:** Eggs should be attractively arranged, typically pointed end down, in a clean container or tray. Labels (if required) should be neat and accurate.
- Internal Quality (if judged): When broken out: yolk should be well-rounded and centered, albumen thick and clear, no blood spots or defects.

Tips for Exhibitors

- Always refer to the show schedule and class descriptions.
- Handle with Care: Collect eggs gently and store them in a cool, dry place. Avoid washing unless absolutely necessary—natural bloom is valued.
- Select and Prepare Thoughtfully: Choose eggs that are similar in size and shape. Use a soft cloth to remove any loose dirt, but don't polish or scrub the shells.

TERRARIUMS

General Criteria for Terrariums

- Plant Health & Selection: Plants should be thriving, well-suited to terrarium conditions, and complementary in form and colour.
- Design & Composition: The layout should be balanced, harmonious, and visually appealing, with thoughtful layering and placement.
- Container Suitability: The container should be clean, clear, and appropriate for the scale and style of the terrarium.
- Substrate & Hardscape: Base layers (soil, gravel, etc.) should be well-prepared and clean; hardscape elements like rocks or wood should be stable and integrated.
- Creativity & Theme: Entries may reflect a theme or concept; originality and imagination are encouraged.
- Maintenance & Cleanliness: No visible pests, mould, or debris; glass should be clean and clear.

Tips for Exhibitors

- Always refer to the show schedule and class descriptions.
- Balance Beauty and Function: Choose plants that thrive in enclosed environments (e.g., ferns, mosses, fittonia). Avoid overcrowding—leave space for airflow and visual clarity.
- Tell a Story: A terrarium with a theme—like "forest floor," "desert bloom," or "mini bushland"—can captivate judges. Use natural materials to enhance the narrative.

SCARECROW

General Criteria for Scarecrow

- Creativity & Originality: The scarecrow should reflect a unique concept, imaginative design, and inventive use
 of materials
- Construction & Durability: The build should be stable, weather-resistant, and securely assembled for outdoor display.
- Use of Material: Recycled, natural, or themed materials are encouraged. Details should be thoughtful and safe.
- Theme Representation: Entries should clearly connect to the "Seeds of Change" theme or class concept.
- Visual Appeal: The scarecrow should be expressive, well-proportioned, and visually engaging from a distance.

Tips for Exhibitors

- Always refer to the show schedule and class descriptions.
- Build for the Outdoors: Use sturdy frames and weather-friendly materials. Test stability before delivery—wind and rain are part of the challenge!
- Tell a Story: A scarecrow with a name, theme, or message (e.g., "Water-Wise Wanda" or "Captain Compost") adds charm and connection to the audience.

NOVELTY

General Criteria for Novelty

- Creativity & Imagination: Entries should show original ideas, clever designs, and expressive decoration.
- Effort & Neatness: Decorations should be carefully made, with attention to detail and a tidy finish.
- Use of Materials: Craft items, natural or recycled materials should be used safely and thoughtfully.
- **Theme or Character:** The entry should clearly represent a theme, character, or story (e.g., animal, person, superhero).
- Presentation & Impact: The decorated egg or potato should be fun, eye-catching, and well displayed.


Tips for Exhibitors






